The Old, Old Story

In both our Traditional worship services and our Transformation Worship, Pastor Steve and Pastor Matt will lead us through this time of anticipation with sermon series intended to focus us on the significance of the coming of the messiah, and it all leads us to Christmas Eve worship where we will once again sing the songs, light the candles and tell the old, old story of the miraculous birth of the baby who carried God's spirit into the world, so that we could come to know him better.

Thoughts from Steve

My grandchildren like to curl up on my lap to have me read a story that has been read to them hundreds of times. They love the way I "dramatize" the stories and change my voice for each character. I must admit that it is a very special time for me as well. They know all the characters, and know what each is going to say. They know the story so well they can pretend to read by looking at the pictures. My grandchildren like what is familiar. They can tell the story by heart.

Our children have made sure our grandchildren have learned the Christmas story. We can tell, because they also know this extraordinary story by heart. This time of the year, I will read the "old, old story" to them, and they will almost recite with me word for word. For me, it brings to life the "old, old story" of Jesus birth as a new generation becomes familiar with this extraordinary event that changed the world.

Perhaps the "old, old story" never grows old, but when I have been telling it for years, it becomes increasingly difficult to find ways to challenge the congregation to hear it with new ears and see it with fresh eyes. You know all the characters by heart, but your familiarity with the story may prevent you from asking yourself, "What does this mean for me?"

There is an old proverb that says, "Though Christ a thousand times in Bethlehem be born, if he is not born in thee, thy soul is still forlorn." My greatest desire in preaching is to bring the Word to life on Sunday morning. It is in the opening passages of the gospel of John that inspires me to seek to find new ways to tell the "old, old story." John shares his version of the Christmas story in this way: "The Word became flesh and made his home among us." This is called the Incarnation in theological terms that reflects God coming to our world to live among us in taking the human form of Jesus.

My prayer is that Christmas becomes more to you than hearing the "old, old story", singing a few familiar Christmas carols and lighting a candle. My wish is that in revisiting these tried and true traditions is an opportunity to once again welcome Jesus to make a home in your heart. At Christmas, this becomes a life changing moment for all of us when we celebrate Jesus making his home among us.

Every Christmas Eve I have a conversion moment in singing "Silent Night" while holding a burning candle. It is in that moment I can look at the faces of our congregation all reflecting a warm glow of the candles and see hope, peace, joy and love. I see families reunited, and children I've baptized who have returned home from College. I see a grandparent lovingly surrounded by their children and grandchildren because there is someone very special missing from their family. I see couples I've married standing with their first bundle of joy. I wish you could see what I see every Christmas. I work 365 days a year so I can have the "best seat in the house." It never gets old!

In this season of preparation, may all of us rediscover the promise of the "old, old story" that "the Word became flesh and made his home among us."


Apportionments: A Big Part of Our Budget

If you take a look at our church budget, you'll notice a large item named "apportionments". Apportionments are the monies we pay to support the structure of the larger United Methodist Church - the UMC beyond our local Cedar Falls First church.

Apportionments, like everything else, seem to cost more every year, and you may wonder how our church's share is computed and what exactly we are paying for. To help answer questions like that, we will be hosting our Iowa Conference treasurer, Maggie Biggs, on Sunday, January 14.

We are one of the top ten churches in the lowa Conference, and so Treasurer Biggs will visit us personally to lead this discussion. All interested people are invited to hear her presentation, and ask questions. Questions may be submitted anonymously to the church office, and we will pass them on to Ms. Biggs, or you may ask her directly when she is here. This visit by Treasurer Biggs is an exciting opportunity to learn more of the scope of the United Methodist Church. Do your homework before she comes: take a look at the "Hope Made Real" Narrative Budget publication from the Communications Office of the Iowa Conference. It contains numbers, statistics, graphics, and real-world stories of how our apportionment dollars support our church and make a difference in the lives of others around the world. The new Fast Track Disciple Series is designed for busy lives. The study is divided into two 12 week long studies. You read a manageable 3-5 chapters of the Bible daily in preparation for the weekly 75 minute class. It uses the same format as Disciple with renown Biblical Scholars sharing about our weekly readings.

This year our bishop, Laurie Haller, encouraged Iowa United Methodists to become difference makers in the world. Making a difference can be a small, personal act, or it can be a huge, global effort, and you, First UMC of Cedar Falls, are difference-making rock stars. Here is a list of some of the gifts that we have given the world this year.



Church members donated enough money to provide 160 Church World Service Blankets to those in crisis.



Our Wee Care ministry through Love INC provided diapers and other baby care supplies with 133 appointments with families in the Cedar Valley.

Sent over 100 Bibles to our sisters in Christ at the Women at the Well UMC in the women's prison in Mitchellville. We also support this church behind the razor wire with monthly financial help, and a group joined the W@W for a worship service this summer. We have two Reentry teams that walk alongside and support ex-offenders who have been released to the metro area.

We provided new books to all Kindergarten through 3rd grade students at Lincoln Elementary School, our Partner in Education. Many church members also partner with Lincoln School students and teachers by giving time each week as Reading Buddies for students in grades K-3.



Donated \$1400 to the Back to School Project to provide local students with new school supplies for the school year. Some church members volunteered time as well.



A family from our church traveled to Chatham Illinois to group to help in the warehouse at Midwest Mission Distribution Center



We supported the BTS/CF FirstUMC pulpit swap with John Pena and Steve Williams, and collected medical supplies and \$1000 for the medical clinic on campus.

Sent a multi-generational work crew to Henderson Settlement Work Camp in Kentucky. Some of the work campers painted a food pantry on site and helped with other on-site ministries, and the rest worked off site at homes in the economically depressed area in Appalachia.

Delivered a truckload of personal care items such as tissues, soaps and shampoo for the NE IowaFood Bank in July. We also collected and donated over 1,030 jars of peanut butter for the NE Iowa Food Bank during the summer months (crunchy won). Collected over \$900 and 122 lbs of food for the NE Iowa Food Bank Thanksgiving Meal promotion. A group from First UMC donates their time by helping at the Food Bank at least one evening a month.



We supported Heifer International all year with various promotions to support our lessfortunate neighbors all over the world, including:

bees and beehives (early winter) chicks and rabbits (Lent) milk producing animals (summer) sending girls to school (fall) wool producing animals (November) alternate gift giving (December)

We raised over \$1230 for CROP Hunger Walk, and a group of church members joined a walk to raise awareness of the hungry in our community and around the world. A group of volunteers also helped at a local "Feed My Starving Children" food packing event.

Church members purchased and donated building supplies and paint for the new House of Hope home. Nearly \$5,500 was sent to House of Hope throughout 2017.

In 2017 our church assembled \$11,220 worth of UMCOR kits for our annual Ingathering Mission Party: 174 Health kits, 12 sewing kits, 636 school kits, 28 layettes, and 90 baby jackets. Proceeds from 24 First UMC quilts and table runners came up to \$1865.

We provided Christmas gift help to families in our local area- about 20 families from Lincoln and North Cedar Elementary School in Cedar Falls were blessed, as well as a family at House of Hope in Waterloo.

First UMC hosts the weekly free Community Meal to approximately 175-200 guests every Tuesday. Our church members plan, prepare, serve and clean up the meal once a month.

The quilters and stitchers have made and distributed 52 quilts for foster kids and 27 comfort quilts in 2017. In addition, this group has made and presented about a dozen quilts to infants through youth who were baptized in our church. And they sewed over 600 cloth bags for school supplies for UMCOR.



We continue to provide missionary support to Larry and Jane Kies at Africa University in Zimbabwe. This is a decades long tradition of First UMC.

This is a list of just the outreach efforts that we are tracking for our annual church reports. There are other individuals and groups within the church who are reaching out in other ways on their own. It is important to realize that on the other end of every mission dollar that we contribute, or every hour of our time that we donate, there is a human being whose life is impacted in a positive way because of our efforts. As we embrace our call to be generous and compassionate, we live closer to the Christian ideal, and truly become difference makers.
